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
Improving Turnaround Time of First Dose IV Antibiotic in Pediatric Inpatient Units (2N1, 2N3) in HGH

PROBLEM: An audit in April-May 2013 revealed that the average turnaround time of first dose IV Antibiotic (from prescription to actual patient delivery) in 2N1 and 2N3 was 3 hours 30 min. None of these doses were administered to the patient within one hour of prescription.

<u>AIM</u>: To improve the turnaround time of first dose IV antibiotic to one hour(or less) in 30% of the cases by January 31st 2014 in two pediatric inpatient units (2N1, 2N3) in HGH.

INTERVENTIONS: (started June 2012)

- ■Physicians to write all first dose IV antibiotic as "STAT" & to handover prescription directly to the nurse
- ■Prescribing physician to ensure (or arrange) for suitable IV access during prescribing
- ■Education of nurses: to fax first dose IV antibiotic prescriptions to the pharmacy ASAP
- Maintenance of a log book in each unit to document all first dose antibiotic prescriptions including patient details, time of prescription, time of administration and contributing reasons incase of any delay
- First Dose Antibiotic Delivery in 1 hour was made a Quality and Patient Safety (QPS) indicator

CONCLUSIONS:

■The interventions were started in June 2012 and education was reinforced over the coming months with spot checks
■Data of patients who received their first dose antibiotic in 2N1 and 2N3 was recorded on a daily basis from Dec 2012 onwards
■The percentage of cases receiving first dose antibiotic within one hour improved from 0% to 39% and the average turnaround time for all first dose IV antibiotics reduced from 3 hours 30 min to

1 hours 44 min. **NEXT STEPS:**

- To achieve 100% compliance in administering first dose antibiotic within one hour by end of 2014
- ■Knowledge transfer to other pediatric units
