FAOs

- 1. What if I change my home or work location? Inform your nurse. If you are still within the CST area, the service will come to your new location.
- 2. What happens if I miss the nurse's visit? The nurse will wait 5–10 minutes. After that, you must visit the CDC to take your dose.
- 3. Can I use CST during my vacation?

 Notify the nurse. Arrangements will be made for you to pick up your medicines and temporarily switch to VDOTS.
- 4. How is CST better than other DOTS options? CST saves time and money. It's more convenient than VDOTS or clinic visits

Community Supervised Therapy (CST)

What is Tuberculosis (TB)?

TB is a disease caused by bacteria. It can affect the lungs (Pulmonary TB) or other body parts (Extrapulmonary TB).

Types of TB:

- 1. Latent TB:
- The bacteria are inactive and do not make you sick.
- Without treatment, 1 in 10 people with latent TB may develop active TB.
- 2. Active TB:
- The bacteria attack your body, causing symptoms such as:
 - Cough
 - Weight loss
 - Night sweats
 - Fever

What is DOTS?

Directly Observed Treatment-Shortcourse. (DOTS) means a health worker watches you take each dose of your TB medicines.

What is CST?

Community Supervised Therapy (CST) is DOTS done in your community. A CST nurse brings you your TB medicines and watches you take it at your home or workplace.

Who Can Get CST?

CST is offered to adults managed in CDC outpatient clinics who:

- Want care close to home within the CST coverage (or designated) area.
- Need help taking their medicine daily.
- Are elderly, disabled, or far from healthcare centers.
- Do not qualify for other DOTS options, like (video DOTS).

You must have a doctor's referral and meet with the CST nurse to enroll.

What Does the CST Nurse Do?

- Visits you at a time and place of your choice.
- Brings your TB medicines and makes sure you take it correctly.
- Tracks your progress and updates your doctor.
- Refers you to the doctor if problems arise.
- Maintains privacy and confidentiality.

Your Responsibilities as a Patient

- Be at the agreed time and place for your appointment.
- Show your ID (QID, passport, or health card).
- Tell the nurse about any side effects.
- Take your medicine while the nurse is present.
- Notify the nurse about schedule or location changes.
